The staff at the City of Berkeley is working busily to loosen requirements and permits for putting stuff all over the sidewalk for merchants and business owners while simultaneously making it impossible for homeless and poor people to do the same, leaving the legal department in quite a lather of excitement.

"We've had some needles to thread in our time," stated Zach Cowan, City Attorney, "but this one is kind of special because we have the opportunity to shore up the mythology about homeless people ruining business. There's got to be a vice chancellorship in that down the road."

Cowan was referring to the effort to obscure the October 2010 financial report which clearly shows that the areas of town with the most homeless people, transient youth, and panhandlers were the areas which were best off economically, an inconvenient truth for those who wish to

outlaw sidwalk sitting, panhandling, or any

behavior strictly related to visible poverty.

"It's a challenge," stated Cowan, "but we're up to it. After all, we've met this kind of challenge before.'



A bunch of hackers apparently succeeded in shutting down the websites of the Orlando Chamber of Commerce and Universal Studios recently as a gesture in support of Food Not Bombs participants jailed for feeding the hungry.

"It's so discouraging seeing these hungry people out in public," explained Orlando Mayor Buddy Dyer. "We're just trying to keep things upbeat around here."

Food Not Bombs co-founder Keith McHenry says the group kept pretty upbeat in jail despite being forced to pay for portions of their stay. Every inmate at the 33rd Street jail must pay \$5 to get booked and \$1.50 a day plus \$5 for each medically prescribed pill they give you.

"The phones are on a system where your family of friends need to go online to make a payment plan," stated McHenry. "But we're a pretty dedicated bunch. In some ways it's a pretty good way to spend the Fourth of July.

Tasers on the Way *for Your Own Good*

Despite hundreds turning out to overwhelmingly protest a proposal to develop a policy for the implementation of Tasers, the San Francisco Police Commission voted in favor of the proposal because while Tasers are kind of unpredictable to use, the off chance that they will occasionally function as intended remains a vague possibility, however distant.

Immigrant advocacy groups, communities of color, queer and transgender communities, mental-health professional organizations, and civil rights watchdog groups all seemed not to understand how important it is for a police officer to have an array of options at hand for the unique situations on the street that might require lethal force, sometimes non-lethal but occasionally lethal force, sometimes non-lethal but occasionally lethal force for just some people, or sometimes non-lethal but occasionally lethal force for just some people on some occasions.

"It's tricky," agreed one police officer at the meeting. "The gun, the Taser, the pepper spray, and the baton are all good, of course, but the more choices there are the more mixed up you can get. Sometimes I just stand there staring at my belt trying to remember why I came in the room."

Police Officer Association officials agreed that the baffling raft of choices can sometimes confuse even the most experienced of officers, but pointed out that manufacturers of new sometimes-but-not-always lethal Taser International Inc. stun guns transmit 50,000 volts of electricity through up to two inches of clothing, and it's perfectly safe!



weapons need someone to try the new stuff out and who else is best situated to give the stuff a whirl than your local police force.

"You can't just try this stuff on guinea pigs and get a good sense of how it works and how far out to hold it and stuff," stated one representative from the Association. "You really need to try it on people in real time in real situations with your buddies around to give you pointers."

Other officers agreed, and suggested that further technology might solve some of the confusion which currently exists regarding which weapon to use when.

"Boot the whole issue over to Google," stated one officer. "Have them combine all these capabilities into one weapon, then work up an algorithm so the weapon itself sizes up the situation and makes the determination about which element to unleash, bullet, pepper spray, etc."

"Then we can relax," agreed another officer. "And maybe leave out the baton. I can always figure out when to use that one."

hired for the Solano Stroll event this Sep-


tember play for free.

organizers dismissed the concern.

"Musicians are used to this," they countered. "Musicians have so much fun playing music that they shouldn't get paid anyway."

"They have better training for this than anybody else," said one Solano Avenue merchant. "They all have four or five jobs and have long ago learned to eat little sticks and pebbles to supplement their diets."

"We'd really like to contribute \$25 apiece to a musicians' fund," stated another Solano Avenue merchant. "But it would be

unfair to them to get them used to being paid since the nonpayment policy works so well for us we'll probably turn this test run into policy every year."

Experts on musicians agreed that as a group these are the people most likely to expect nothing and would probably just thank the Stroll organizers for the honor of being picked to perform for free.

"They'll probably send little thankyou notes on pretty stationary," affirmed one expert. "They'll say they had lots and lots of fun."

"That's right," nodded another Solano Avenue merchant vigorously. "They're a very delicate group, and very, very sensitive. The cruelest thing to do would be to give them hope."

Polar Bears Get A Lot More Exercise These Days -

Unlike the Rest of Us

A new study by a team consisting of the United States Geological Survey and the World Wildlife Fund confirms that polar bears are swimming longer distances to find sea ice habitat, suggesting that waterwings, swimfins, and noodles are necessary for species survival.

A sample of 68 female bears wearing radio collars and tasteful floral bathing caps comprised the study subjects.

"They're very good swimmers," stated the abstract, noting that one polar bear swam 427 miles to reach sea ice and is being considered for Olympic contention.

Skeptics criticized the study for focusing on the downside of global warming, pointing out that warming the temperature of arctic waters makes them much more com-

fortable for swimming.

"I like a nice, hot bath," stated one skeptic, annoyed that the Fish and Wildlife Service's decision to list the bear as threatened because of the impact of climate change on their habitat was upheld by a federal district judge three weeks ago who probably spends his or her spare time hugging trees. "I'll bet most polar bears are really enjoying the change."

Polar bears themselves neglected to weigh in on the increasing lengths of their swims, but cautioned the public not to read into their silence on the subject.
