

# **Revealed As Instruments of Mass Destruction**

Critics countered that the shooting death of Armando Cañizales, a viola player with the Simón Bolivar Musical Foundation, was not the responsibility of violins but rather violas.

"Specifically his own viola," stated the Venezuelan authorities looking into Cañizales' death. "He did leave his viola at home on the day in question, but that doesn't mean the instrument was not involved."

Musicians worldwide are deeply concerned about Venezuela's food shortages, triple digit inflation, and growing political polarization, but share the government's deep concern over the immediate danger from violins and perhaps from other


