LANDMARK FRIENDS AND FOES STILL BAFFLED BY FLIERS

While the nation experienced regime change, the mid-term election in Berkeley firmly endorsed the political status quo with the clear exception of landmark issues, which nobody seems able to adequately explain.

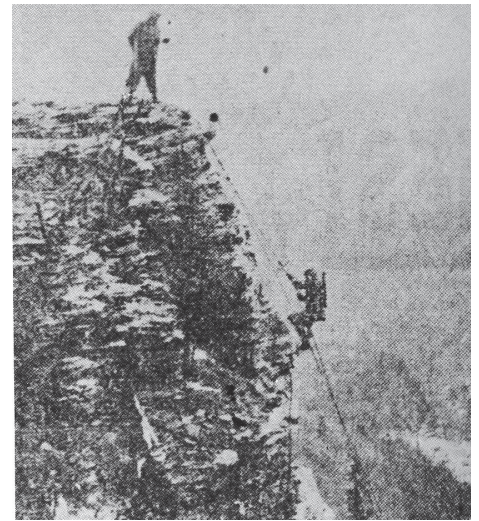

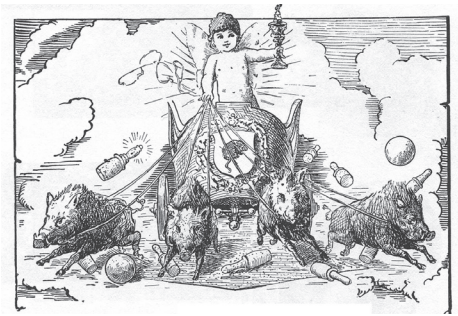
Critics protested that Santa Claus' interest is only in toy guns, and that distributing toys through rooftop chimneys was a hallowed holiday tradition.
