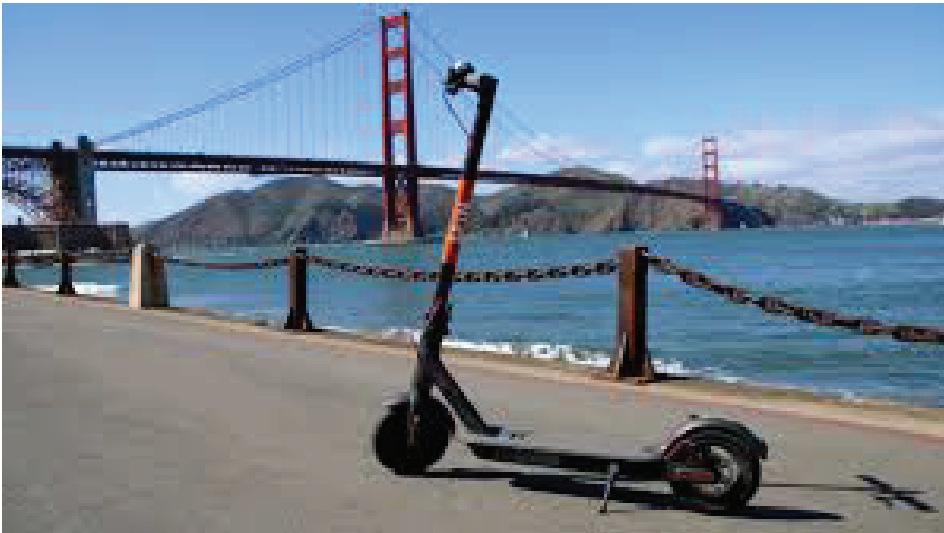

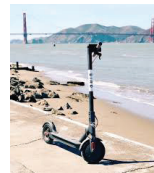
recently was relentlessly negative, focusing on blocked curb cuts, sidewalks, and helmetless riders behaving badly.

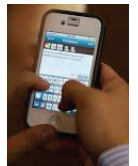
"I relate to the beat-up ones," acknowledged one local voter. "I saw one this morning completely dismantled with its parts displayed in creative patterns. It actually made me cry."

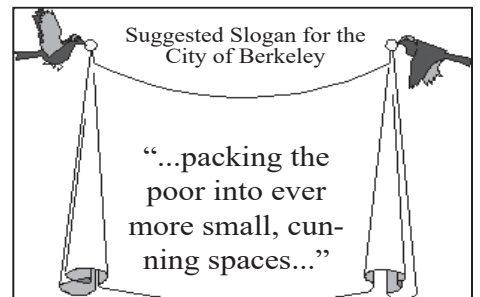
TWITTER USE is apparently somewhat addictive.

Community Relations Can't Get Lower, Bound to Improve

The Oakland Police Department has joined at least 40 other police departments in acquiring enough donations to create a mounted patrol of two large and two miniature horses in a desperate effort to become better loved by a skeptical public.

Chief of Police Anne Kirkpatrick assured the public that the animals will not be armed, a great relief to most Oakland residents and visitors.

"I'm sure tired of wearing Kevlar," offered one Lake Merritt reveler at a local barbecue. "And so are my kids."

"These horses never racially profile anyone," added Chief Kirkpatrick. "At least not yet."

Critics argued that horses are a lot less practical than bikes, motorcycles, or scooters, the latest conveyances cluttering sidewalks, because they require so much care, feeding, grooming, hoof-trimming, teeth floating, and tend to scare easily if a piece of paper blows along the ground nearby and throw their rider.

"That's part of what we're counting on," stated Chief Kirkpatrick. "It's hard to get any sympathy when you're a police officer. But if you get thrown off Desperation, uh, I mean Cinnamon, people tend to send you flowers in the hospital."

"If this doesn't help matters we're going to try goldfish and have a marine patrol," stated one Oakland officer. "Something's gotta work."

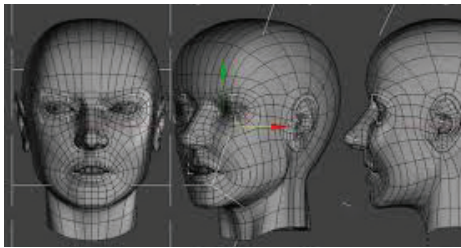

Facial Id Programs Are Really Racist

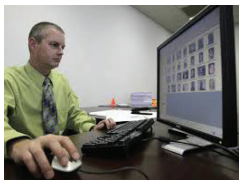
- Way Worse Than the Lake Merritt Barbecue Lady



AN MIT STUDY OF THREE COMMERCIAL facial analysis programs reveals that inaccuracies skyrocket for minority groups and machines really like people who look like the programmer's mother.

Facial identification programs already in use in police departments nationwide are terrible at interpreting data about minorities according to an MIT study of three separate and currently available commercial programs.

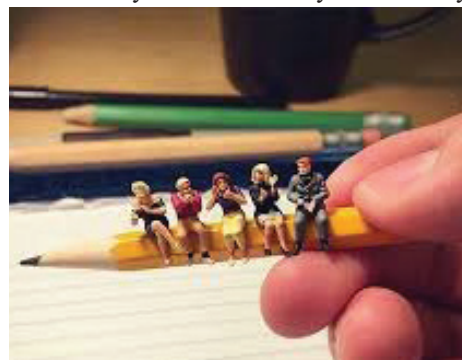

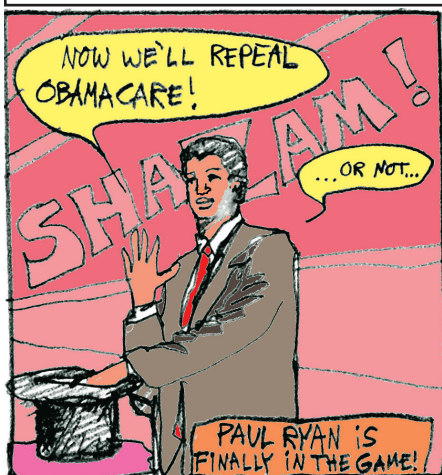
