ditional aversion to comfortable benches in public streets and plazas. "She got a call from someone near Channing Way and Shattuck who just couldn't stand Gypsy and Cowboy sitting on the bench in front of King Dong, so she had the bench hauled away.

"That's right," affirmed reporter Sloan Down, who had covered the uproar about the hearing-free public bench removal for the local civil liberties and arts newspaper called the Hard Times, which revealed Councilmember Dona Spring's sole role in the removal. "Spring never apologized. Quite the opposite; she challenged Hard Times' editor, Bob Nichols, to put the missing bench in front of his house to 'see how you like it', according to the postcard she sent him, which he then published."

The recent rain of guerilla benches were the natural result of the bench dearth. Cal grad Mingwei Samuel and housing and transit activist Darrell Owens have contributed around two dozen benches to the bus transit landscape and more are on the way.

The City of Berkeley removed and replaced the project's initial bench, but quickly lost the race to replace the benches, which proved popular with tired bus riders sick of having to crouch on the cold, dirty sidewalks of Oakland and Berkeley. But Business Improvement Districts are fighting back.

"We hate people," explained Berkeley's Downtown Business Association (DBA) CEO John Caner. "We spent more money trying to criminalize sitting down BENCHES APPEAR IN proudly.'

Ivana Trump told Vanity Fair in 1990 that her former spouse "used to keep a book of Adolph Hitler's speeches in his bedside cabinet." Trump has consistently been a fanboy of authoritarian leaders Putin, Kim Jong Un and Victor Orban.

Similar Beginnings: Hitler wrote his guiding treatise "Mein Kampf" in 1925 while in prison for his attempted coup. Trump has developed his MAGA movement while attempting a coup and other crimes, but with four criminal cases and 91 indictments, something is bound to stick eventually. But hey, if he goes to prison maybe he will write a book.

based on German hyper-nationalism where the "other" was blamed for all of Germany's problems. In Germany the "other" was identified as Jews, Marxists, Gypsies and trade unionists. Much propaganda was organised to dehumanize people in these groups to make it easier to use physical violence against them. Trump's MAGA movement has a similar nationalism where he blames all problems on the "other". Trump's "other" is immigrants, LGBTQ people, participants in the union movement, Democrats and any other political opponents. The MAGA movement spends a lot of energy attempting to dehumanise members of these groups to facilitate threats or physical violence, with Charlottesville and January 6th being examples. Recent Trump comments saying migrants are "not people" and stating "it's going to be a bloodbath for the country" if he is not elected suggest the dehumanisation and violence propaganda is still ramping up.

Specific Comments: Trump's recent comment that undocumented immigrants were "poisoning the blood of our country" seem to be a direct paraphrase from Hitler's Mein Kampf reference to immigrants "the poison of foreign races is eating into the body of our people."

Cult of Personality: Hitler and his party

promoted the idea that only Hitler could save Germany which gave rise to the "Fuhrer-cult". Trump's MAGA cult following is similar; they rally around Trump's comment, "I alone can fix it."

Country Situations: Late 1920s/early 1930s Germany was in economic depression, with hyperinflation causing widespread hardship and discontent. Hitler and the Nazi party stepped into this breach winning 37.3% of the votes in the 1932 election, making it the largest political party in Germany. Weak safeguards of democracy allowed Hitler by 1935 to turn Germany into a dictatorship. Trump MAGA won in 2016 with 45.9% and lost in 2020 with 46.8% of the vote. The

recovery from COVID 19 was economically difficult, but the US economy has performed well with low unemployment, high job growth and inflation down in the 3% range. Trump has already said that if elected, "I'd be a dictator on day one."



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Compared to Trump's MAGA fascist rhetoric, the fascist rhetoric of 1930s Germany sounded better because it was in German, a continent away, 90 years ago and was eventually defeated and discredited. While the US has better safeguards of its democratic structure, the risk is higher due to a large minority embracing MAGA fascism. Oh well, just another definition of "Amerikanischer Exzeptionalismus". It already sounds better in German.
