SF Homeless Program Tops the Nation at \$61,000 Per Tent



THE ANNUAL COST OF SAN FRANCISCO'S HOMELESS TENTS has won national acclaim as the highest and hasn't dented the popularity of homelessness in the least.

"It sounds steep, we know," stated interim director of the homeless department Abigail Steward-Kahn regarding the \$61,000 annual cost of one city shelter tent. "We didn't have time for a more thorough bidding process and vacant lots are notorious for having no water or electrical hook-ups, none of the amenities of a campground."

"It fits right in with the culture here," explained Supervisor Rafael Mandelman. "Of course these tents are high end. This is San Francisco."

Others agreed, including Mayor London Breed, who pointed out that if the city mixed in a few tourists in Airstreams, which typically rent at around \$1,500 per weekend, the overall cost of a city camp site would cover itself.

"We thought it was going to be covered by Federal Emergency Management money," confided Mandelman. "When that didn't work out we funded it through a state

grant combined with general fund and business taxes, and the mayor wants all those budgets reduced despite us not making a dent in the population still sleeping in the streets.

Others think the "glamping", or glamorous camping solution has real legs.

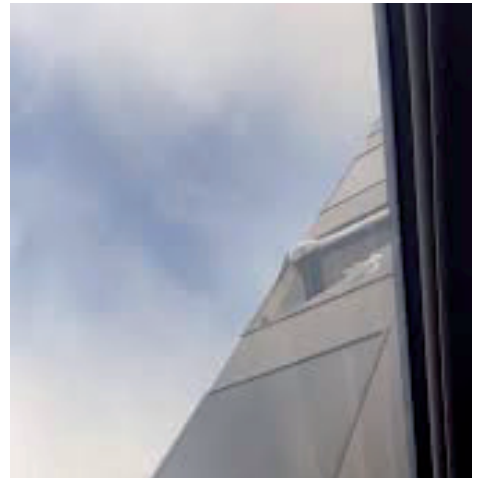
"A lot of business class visitors would love it," commented one conventioneer who acknowledged that his business seminars didn't leave much time for enjoying hotel amenities.

City staff agreed that city camp sites' "GLAMPING", OR GLAMOROUS CAMPING, has real buzz nationwide and most tents have a little hook in the top for the chandelier.

"It can't cost that much to put a piece of chocolate on a pillow," mused Mandelman. "At \$61,000 per tent we ought to just do that for everybody."

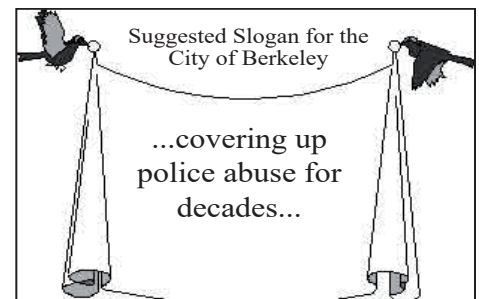

Dear Lena, because I thought they were green and of course I took that stupid survey and all my replies were apparently on the wrong side of everything.

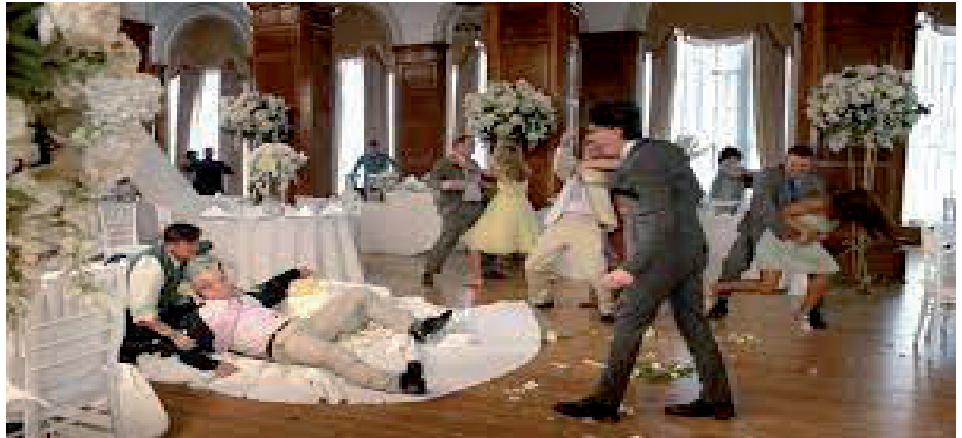
Dear reader, thanks, brother, now we're all screwed including our most beautiful park.

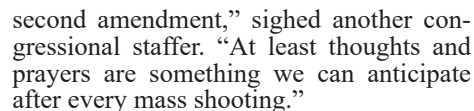

Air traffic controllers stated through a spokesperson that they would be glad to help, but that the resurgence of plane travel had created a shortage of trained personnel at airports.

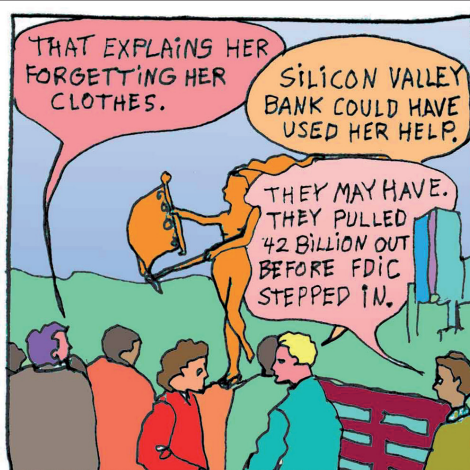
"This is one job you can't work from home," commented another air traffic controller, Pierre Indameer, who hasn't had a vacation in years. "At least not yet."

true.

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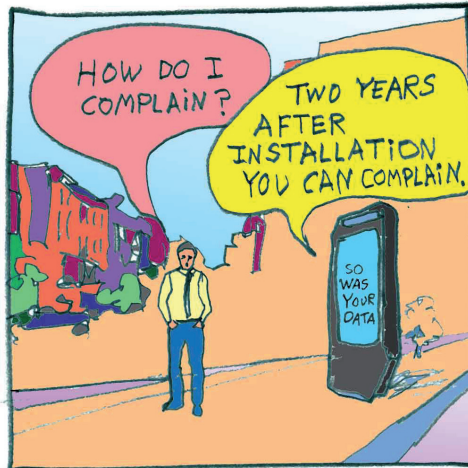
