SPY BALLOONS are often spotted at People's Park as part of the ÛC regents' undercover efforts to undo over 50 years of peace, love, and user development.

"The university's required Environmental Impact

Report (EIR) failed to justify the decision not to consider alternative locations to the People's Park project" stated Judge Jackson in the Division Five Appellate Court's tentative opinion reversing an initial ruling in UC's favor by Oakland Superior Court Judge Roesch. "Our task is modest. We must apply the laws that the Legislature has written to the facts in the record. In each area where the EIR is deficient the EIR skipped a legal requirement, or the record did not support the EIR's conclusions, or both."

District Seven's City Councilperson, Rigel Robinson, insists that trees, parks, open space and cultural landmarks impede environmental progress and that any use of CEOA is in and of itself "sabotage" and an "abuse" so severe as to have a "chilling" effect on the University of California's free speech, a claim revived from a UC claim made in the 1990's which Bernard Witkin, the foremost scholar on California legal treatises, noted as a "case of first impression", or a case determining a legal point never before addressed.

Judge Donald King had stated, in his dis-

missal of a defamation suit, ""If government is compelled to guarantee the truth

of its factual assertions on matters of public interest, its speech would be substantially inhibited, and the citizenry would be less informed."

When the laughter died down, the government had, for the first time in legal history, claimed rights formerly held by the people to protect themselves from government abuses, a right that certainly includes the right to lie, obfuscate, and mischaracterize its political opponents as Rigel Robinson does in his recent screed against his political opponents.

"We didn't think we were committing sabotage by simply speaking," mused one of the litigants whose claim that UC's Environmental Impact Report was inadequate was upheld by the courts. "And we simply didn't realize that trees and parks impede environmental progress."

"One way to cut costs is to have more efficient floorplans. In a typical apartment building, circulation (hallways, stairs, and elevators) takes up around 12%-20% of each floor. In short, that means 12%-20% of your rent isn't paying for the apartment, it's paying for hallways," he opines. It's those pesky hallways and staircases, he suggests, which are responsible for high rents and construction costs. Fire safe walls, doors and sprinklers share responsibility as well, discouraging developers who need higher profits to make their lives seem at all worthwhile.
