

Wells Fargo CEO Promíses to Stop **Stealing from the Poor**

Wells Fargo CEO John Stumpf, who made \$19.3 million in compensation in 2015 and was named CEO of the year, has no plans to step down after revelations that the bank had opened more than two million checking, savings, credit or debit card accounts without bothering to get permission from their customers, costing them on average \$25 per account.

Wells Fargo refunded \$5 million in fraudulent fees but argued that \$5 billion per quarter cannot be wrong, a determination with which the Wells Fargo Board of Directors agreed wholeheartedly.

"We fired 5,300 lower level employees," pointed out Wells Fargo spokesman Richele Messick. "We absolutely regret that this happened and these employees do, too.'

Los Angeles City Attorney Mike Feuer blew the whistle on Wells Fargo's exotic practices in 2013, building a case against the bank based on thousands of responses from customers suddenly getting fined for not having money in accounts they never knew they had.

The employees were being pressured to make sales quotas according to Greg McBride, chief financial analyst with Bankrate.com.

"They have run out of growth from acceptable methods," he stated, and Wells Fargo agreed.
